FIRESIDE CHAT

Try sharing out in a different kind of way. Consider using a 'Fireside Chat' format.

Sometimes sharing out in a whole group – especially if not everyone knows everyone or if it's a large group – can be intimidating and eat up a lot of time. This format helps to reduce the pressure that participants sometimes feel when they are the sole center of attention. "Yikes! They're all looking at me!"

To organize a fireside chat for your conference, training, or small group gathering, here are some simple recommendations to help you do it well:

- Instruct participants to interact with their chat partner(s). Try to keep the group to 1-2 participants. Make sure it's a two-sided conversation and not a one-way chat. Be sure there is enough time to hear each person's point of view and give each other their undivided attention.

- Encourage participants to find somewhere comfortable and cozy - away from a large conference room-type table to discuss/share their ideas with another person.

- Set a roadmap. Determine the key points of your chat in advance and organize them in a logical progression including the length of each segment and the whole. Announce the structure at the beginning of your session and track the milestones as you proceed.

Above all, it should be conversational.
